


# Holy Cross School Newsletter Friday 14<sup>th</sup> June 2024

# Composer of the Week: Aaron Copland



This week, we explored the life and works of Aaron Copland as our Composer of the Week. Aaron Copland, an iconic American composer, is celebrated for his ability to capture the spirit of the American landscape through his music. Born in 1900, Copland's works include well-known pieces such as "Appalachian Spring," "Fanfare for the Common Man," and "Rodeo," which have become staples of the American classical music repertoire. # UNICEF Rights Respecting School



This week, we observed World Day Against Child Labour in our UNICEF oracy sessions. We learned about the harsh realities faced by children who are forced to work and the severe consequences this has on their education, health, and well-being. Our discussions were anchored around UNICEF Articles 32 and 36, which protect children from economic exploitation and harmful work.

During assembly, we delved deeper into specific jobs that children are currently undertaking around the world and explored the crucial work that charities like UNICEF are doing to help these vulnerable children. For homework, students are asked to connect our UNICEF studies with their humanities topics by researching the types of jobs children would have done in historical periods. This activity aims to provide a comprehensive understanding of child labour's impact both past and present, encouraging students to reflect on the importance of protecting children's rights globally.

# Message from Miss Collins:

I have been speaking to a number of parents over recent weeks about the growing campaign to ban smart phones for children in primary schools. Some local authorities have already implemented this ban and there is a push for Lewisham to also adopt this ruling.

The reason for wanting such a ban is because of the increasing amount of research about the damage such phones can have on our children. Primary school children having easy access to the internet on their own phone is a development of recent years and there is now increasing evidence to show the harms attributed to smartphone usage:

• a link between smart phone use and anxiety and depression

- safeguarding risks both through content children can see but also the vulnerability of children walking through the streets with expensive phones out and on show
- a regative impact on children's learning through a dependency on them and a reduction in attention span
- addiction
- sleep issues
- eye damage
- friendship issues

With all this taken into consideration I would like parents who are considering buying their child a mobile phone to seriously think about buying a 'brick phone'. This is a phone which allows you to make calls and send text messages but has no internet access. They are growing in popularity and used by many children now right into secondary school ages.

To begin I would like us, as adults, to be role models for our children and I am asking that from Monday morning when you are bringing your child to School or collecting at the end of the day you do not use your phone on the School site. This will most importantly give you time to talk with your child but also show them that you are reducing your phone usage. I look forward to phone free drop offs and pick ups!

Many thanks for your support, if you have any comments to add to the discussion please do let me know – together we will work for the good of those precious children.
