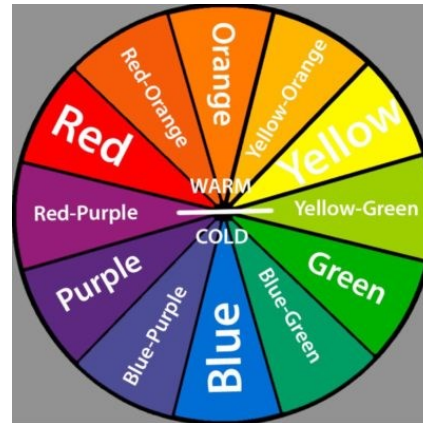

Key Vocabulary

primary colours	These are colours that can't be created by mixing of other colours. Blue, red and Yellow.
secondary colours	Secondary colours include orange, purple, and green, and they're derived from mixing equal amounts of two primary colours.
tertiary colours	Tertiary colours, also known as intermediate colours, are made by combining equal parts of primary and secondary colours.
perspective	Perspective in art usually refers to the representation of three-dimensional objects or spaces in two dimensional artworks.

Collage: (from the French: *coller*, "to glue" or "to stick together";^[1]) is a technique of art creation, primarily used in the visual arts. A collage may sometimes include magazine and newspaper clippings, ribbons, paint, bits of coloured or handmade papers, portions of other artwork or texts, photographs and other found objects, glued to a piece of paper or canvas.



David Hockney

Born 9th July 1937, David Hockney is an English painter, draftsman, printmaker, stage designer, and photographer. As an important contributor to the pop art movement of the 1960s, he is considered one of the most influential British artists of the 20th century.

David Hockney first took a series of photographs of the Grand Canyon and the creation of a number of photo collages of the Grand Canyon in 1986 to try to capture its immense scale and unique beauty.

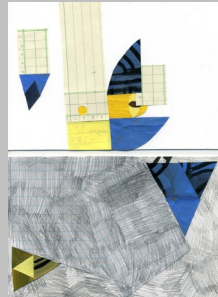


Collage techniques

1. Cut out shapes from painted pieces of paper.



2. Combine "Junk" papers for an interesting background.



3. Try textured paper with photographs..



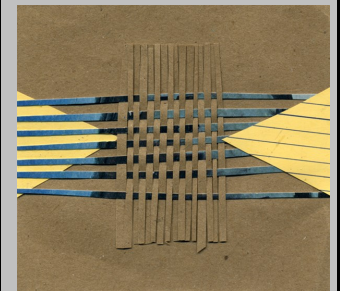
4. Use embroidery thread and fabric.
